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ABOUT THE COLLEGE



SLC is a premier educational institution offering vibrant inclusive environment for the development of excellence in academics, culture, sports and other student empowered activities. Founded in 1964 by the great visionary and entrepreneur Padmashree (late) Shri Shyam Lal Gupta, Shyam Lal College (SLC) is a co-educational constituent college of the University of Delhi. SLC is among the best institutions in the entire University of Delhi, and over the past several years, has been making steady progress towards achieving academic excellence. SLC is a dynamic centre of academic excellence and aspires to make quality education accessible to the students, especially girls, from economically and educationally disadvantaged community of East Delhi. The College campus has sprawling sports ground and is full of lush green lawns and blooming gardens that create natural ambience of holistic teaching learning process. Over a period of 56 years, SLC has evolved into a leading higher education institute of learning, innovation and knowledge creation with consistent good NIRF ranking for Colleges of India – 77th (2022), 69th (2020), 41st (2019) and 61st (2018). The College has also been selected for DBT STAR College Programme under the Ministry of Science and Technology in 2020.

The College has rapidly emerged as a prominent educational institution of the Country and the Hon'ble Vice-President of India Shri M. Venkaiah Naidu has graced our Annual Day and Prize Distribution function, 2018-19. The endeavor of the College has always been to make higher education more committed, job-oriented, meaningful and pragmatic, and at the same time more adaptable to the everchanging demands of our society and globe. The College has taken several innovative initiatives towards

creating a culture of innovation amongst students. SLC established Innovation Council (IC) under MoE's Innovation Cell, an initiative launched in November of 2018. SLC's Innovation Council works towards inculcating the spirit of innovation among students, and develop a start-up ecosystem. The Skill Development Centre of the College offers many value course and Certificate and Diploma courses in German, Spanish, French, Chinese, Japanese, Korean (Affiliated to Department of Germanic and Romanic Studies, University of Delhi) as well as Certificate course in stock trading "Mastering the Stock Market" in collaboration with BSE Institute Ltd. The College also offered value added courses on Yoga and Holistic Development, Research Analytics, Introduction to Artificial Intelligence and Introduction to Bitcoin and Blockchain Technology, Virtual Introduction and Digital Marketing. SLC is a participating institute in the Unnat Bharat Abhiyan (UBA2.0) which is the flagship programme of MoE, GoI. Under this project, SLC has adopted 5 villages - Dhitora (Baghpat), Nithora (Ghaziabad), Chirodi (Ghaziabad), Jawli (Ghaziabad), Kotwalpur (Ghaziabad) to support rural development through institutional linkages. The Unnat Bharat Abhiyan team comprises of faculty members and student members of SLC who have conducted extensive surveys of the said villages, participated in campaign, conducted workshops and interacted with villagers. SLC has achieved another remarkable milestone with Ministry of Education recognizing SLC as SAP (Swachhta Action Plan) institution in 2020.

The College is fully equipped with state-of-the-art Computer labs, Science labs, Knowledge Resource Centre and Library, Sports facilities to upgrade knowledge, skills and capabilities of the students needed to groom them as future leaders. Lot of many new additions in the infrastructure set-up is underway for the benefit of students. At SLC, we encourage our students to become responsible citizens with critical thinking and analytical abilities, thereby contributing to the development of healthy environment and a society free from any kind of discrimination and bias. Our objective is to nourish, nurture and promote holistic higher education, providing equal opportunity to all.

Connectivity

The College is well-connected by the Metro Rail network and road. The flyover network from Welcome Metro Station to ISBT will connect SLC to North Campus, Delhi University with travelling time of 10 minutes. The Metro Stations of Welcome and Shahdara which fall on the Rithala-Shaheed Sthal (New Bus Adda) Metro route via Kashmiri Gate are both at a walking distance from the College and provide the fastest and most convenient mode of transportation from most parts of the city and neighbouring towns of NCR. In addition, the College is well-connected by road and bus services to various parts of the city. The famous Grand Trunk Road (G.T.Road) runs just adjacent to the College and connects it to the neighbouring towns of U.P. such as Sahibabad and Ghaziabad as well. The Inter State Bus Terminal (ISBT) at Kashmiri Gate and ISBT at Anand Vihar are not more than 5 kms away from the College. The Anand Vihar railway station provides very good direct connectivity to the College for students coming from eastern parts of the country.



Social Role

SLC makes all efforts to fulfill its institutional and social responsibilities towards all its stakeholders and the community. Through collaboration with community organizations, industry partners and civic groups, SLC constantly strives to find innovative solutions to societal issues. With the aim to correct gender inequality, the College offers 1% concession in marks at the time of admission to the girl students. The College is also committed to making a contribution in eliminating the prevailing inequality in NCR region through imparting wholesome higher education to all. In practice, the College has been correcting this imbalance at the grass-root level, with its geographical proximity to the most backward localities of Delhi.



Time and again, through its various units like NCC, NSS, Gandhi Study Circle, Ambedkar Study Circle and Eco-Club, the College has initiated social welfare activities and created possibilities for equitable social development. The College also aims at promoting sports and indigenous games and has been actively engaged in providing free and regular coaching to the deserving and talented under-privileged students coming from East Delhi as well as the nearby areas of U.P. A number of awareness programmes including sanitation, plantation drives, financial literacy programmes have been popularized in the nearby areas with the active participation of our students and faculty members and the College strives to continue with the same. With these initiatives, SLC has become a pioneer institution in Delhi. Wi-Fi & CCTV ENABLED MODERN CAMPUS

The College makes continuous endeavour that its infrastructure remains capable of meeting all the diverse needs of a healthy educational system in a dynamic environment. SLC takes pride in being a Wi-Fi and CCTV enabled modern campus. The College has completely renovated its old building with the installation of two lifts, six brand new washrooms and a new reception desk that make it a fully differently-abled friendly area. The lush green gardens in and around the campus have completely changed the landscape of the College. In the academic year 2015-16, the College added an entire new building - the Porta Block to its existing infrastructure. This building has state-of-the-art infrastructure including CCTV surveillance system and a dedicated Conference Hall, Board Room, Teacher's Facilitation Centre with up-to-date ICT facilities. The Staff Room, Library, Office and Cafeteria have been recently renovated into fine air-conditioned spaces. The College has successfully implemented fully functional CCTV



Surveillance system inside and outside the campus. This ensures adequate safety and security to our students. The entire SLC campus is now a Wi-Fi zone with internet access available to each and every student and faculty members of the College. As a premier institution, SLC ensures that this infrastructure remains completely accessible to all its students and faculty, including the differently-abled.

Faculty

The College faculty members are using followingways and platformsto engage with studentstowards continuing teaching-learning process:

- Popularizing theVirtual Lab for the benefits ofthe students.
- Students' engagements through Live Projects.
- Multi - Disciplinary Idea Generation Competitions among students.
- Co-Creation,Co-Sharing of knowledge and dissemination by engaging experts from different fields etc.
- Uploading e-resources on college website forstudent perusal.
- The students access e-resources uploaded by their teachers.
- Engagement of student classes through online platforms like Google Meet and Google Classroom. Teachers engage the students throughout via Zoom, Webex, Skype etc. for innovative, deliberations, competitions and meaning ful mentoring.
- The online class sessions are recorded and sent to students who are unable to join the same.
- The faculty members also use Google classrooms to upload PDF files and videos and solve studentqueries using Cha room options.
- Teachers have used Google forms fortaking tests, projects and assignments.
- The College has made available online reading material to all the students through N-list portal for which all students have been given login and password.
- The College has also provided link on the college website for the reading material made available by the Delhi University library system and SOL.
- The incumbent holds weekly meetings with the TICs via virtual platforms during the Covid-19 for monitoring the smooth functioning of the teaching-learning process and other academic and administrative matters.
- The College also started a helpline for students to help in data recharge of the mobile phones of those students who could not afford data recharge and were, thus, unable to attend online classes and complete assignments.
- The College has also organized series of Webinars and online discussions on various topics of contemporary relevance.
- The College has reached out to the students who have lost their parents during the severe Covid- 19 second wave in April 2021 by initiating a project Anutosh. College has provided immediate counselling from professional counsellor, mentored them towards a safe and professionally secure future and also helping them in academic and other needs.

FLAGSHIP PROGRAMMES

Unnat Bharat Abhiyan, SLC

SLC (University of Delhi), Shyam Lal College is a participating institute in the Unnat Bharat Abhiyan (UBA 2.0) which is the flagship programme of MoE, GoI. Guidelines For Add-on Courses:

1. Admission on First come First Serve Basis.
2. For Certificate Course in Foreign Languages(German/Spanish/French/Chinese/Japanese/Korean)
 - a) Minimum eligibility is 10+2 with 45% aggregate.
 - b) Employees of University of Delhi and other recognized Universities are also eligible.
3. For Diploma in German/Spanish/French/ Chinese/Japanese/Korean: Candidates who have passed the Certificate Examination of the University of Delhi in a language or an examination recognized as equivalent thereto are eligible to apply for admission to the Diploma Course in that language. Candidates who have obtained their Certificate in the language from any other institution OR one year or more before the year of admission shall be required to appear in an admission test. The fee for the entrance test will be ₹. 500/-
4. For Advance Diploma in French/German/Spanish/ Japanese/Chinese/Korean: Candidates who have passed the Diploma Examination of the University of Delhi in a language or an examination recognized as equivalent thereto are eligible to apply for admission to the Advance Diploma Course in that language. Candidates who have obtained their Certificate in the language from any other institution OR one year or more before the year of admission shall be required to appear in an entrance test. The fee for the entrance test will be ₹. 500/-.
5. An amount of ₹. 1000 will be deducted if admission is cancelled.
6. For short term courses, fees once deposited will be non-refundable.
7. Minimum number of students in each batch of language courses: 20 Minimum number of students in each batch of stock market courses & short term IT courses: 30 (Commencement of a course is subject to admission of minimum number of students in it.)Maximum number of students in each batch of all courses: 50
8. Students may enroll in more than one short term course at the same time, as well as any certificate/ diploma/ advance diploma course in addition to the short term course.

In addition to these certificate & Diploma courses, SLC also offers value addition courses on Yoga and Holistic Development, Research Analytics, Digital Marketing, Introduction to Artificial Intelligence and Introduction to Bitcoin, certificate and advance course in computer application, Python for beginners, Entrepreneurship idea development for start-up, Graphic designing, Tour and Travel Management, Human Rights, basics of Latex, IFRS, Cyber Security and Law, Building a Positive Attitude for success and Block chain Technology.

EXTENSION ACTIVITIES

During the course of the year, SL C organized several extension activities such as those for the benefit of students belonging to the under-privileged sections of society, or those meant to celebrate important events in the calendar of the nation. In addition to this, remedial classes are organized under the aegis of IQAC of the College for students from less privileged sections. Department of English, under the guidance of the Principal Prof. Rabi Narayan Kar, started Spoken English Course for the students of the College in the year 2016-17 which has now become a regular feature of the academic activities in the college. The course is primarily meant for those students who face difficulties and are unable to acquire English language skills properly. The Course runs successfully every semester on six or four week basis where the students are given course completion certificates.

Students need a mentor not only in the classroom but also outside it. In continuation of its endeavor to ensure holistic development of the students, the College has initiated the Mentor ship Programme. All the faculty members have been assigned students from different streams so as to ensure a multi-disciplinary learning experience for the students. The Programme shall allow the students to give vent to their ideas and seek valuable advice from their Mentors regarding their academics as well as career and overall development.

INTERNAL QUALITY ASSURANCE CELL (IQAC)

As per National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) guidelines every accredited institution should establish an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) as a post-accreditation quality sustenance measure. 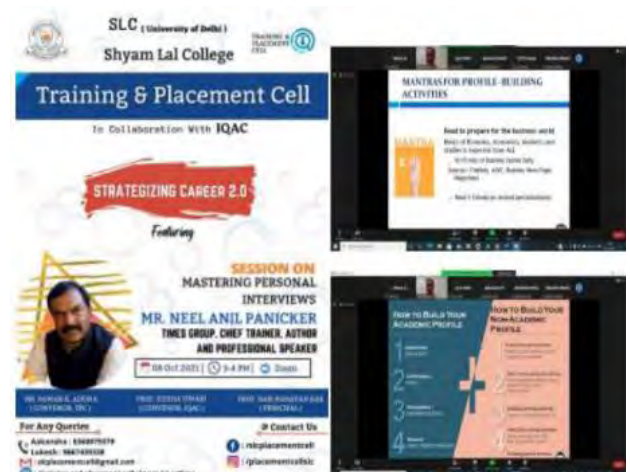
Center for Industry Interaction (CII)

Library

covering some of the other topics of general interest to the readers. The library has OPAC facility to search the collection. In the library, four OPAC machines are installed to help the users. The Library has sufficient reading space with state-of-the-art facilities for the students and teachers, who can sit, interact and study during the college hours. There is a Knowledge Resource Centre in the Library where students and teachers can acquire abundant knowledge through e- resources by accessing world's best databases, E-Journals, E-books and reports in an easy and expeditious manner. The College proudly announces that it has constructed a state-of-the-art Reading Room with a large seating capacity. The library also has an important designated facility for the PwD students of the College in the form of PwD Facilitation Centre which has dedicated computer systems with all the relevant software installed so as to facilitate the smooth imparting of education to PwD students.

Conference Centre & Multi-Purpose Hall

A state-of-the-art air conditioned Conference Hall equipped with all the latest ICT facilities is a new addition to the existing infrastructure. The Conference Hall is fully functional and is utilized to conduct all the academic extension activities, conferences and seminars that are organized in the college. There is a newly constructed Teacher Facilitation Centre to promote research aptitude among the teachers and a Board/Committee room with a huge seating capacity.

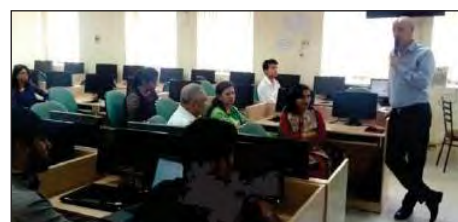


Medical Facility

Girls Common Room

Security Arrangements

The fact that the Shahdara Police Station is situated just adjacent to the College further enhances this sense of security. BEST PRACTICES

SAP (Swachhta Action Plan) Under MoE

SLC has achieved another remarkable milestone with Ministry of Education recognizing SLC as SAP (Swachhta Action Plan) institution in 2020. Under this scheme, SLC has undertaken to work towards essential swachhta activities including sanitation and hygiene, waste management, water management, energy management and greenery. To achieve the above tasks, the College has formed committees that are actively charting out plans to work in the defined areas for maximum benefit of the institution and its stakeholders.

Adoption of Villages

SLC is a participating institute in the Unnat Bharat Abhiyan and has adopted 5 villages in Uttar Pradesh: Dhitora (Baghpat), Nithora (Ghaziabad), Chirodi (Ghaziabad), Jawli (Ghaziabad), Kotwalpur (Ghaziabad). Under this initiative, the UBA team has conducted extensive surveys of the said villages and interacted with villagers and other stakeholders of the villages such as village Pradhans and village panchayat samities and other stakeholders. The village visits, surveys conducted, data collected and interactions with villagers and concerned stakeholders of the villages have helped the team to shortlist problem areas for further assistance. The SLC team planned and executed awareness campaigns for financial literacy including availing government financial incentives and schemes, insurance plans and health insurance, workshops for awareness around sanitation issues in the villages, campaigns about conservation of water, waste management, non-use of polythene, distribution of cloth bags and practical solution for proper waste management.

The College has also taken up the task of helping the ones in distress and to reach out to the villages during Covid-19 pandemic. As part of our social responsibility as an academic institution and on humanitarian grounds too, the College emerged as a flagbearer in spreading awareness about the probable reasons for the spread of Covid-19, its likely implications and what measures to be undertaken to reduce its consequences. A WhatsApp group with members from the villages like the Pradhans, village elders and officials has been formed to spread awareness about the do's and don'ts during this pandemic and the national lockdown. The student members made handmade soap and distributed them in their neighbourhood so as to help people maintain good hygiene and fight this chronic disease. The College is actively involved in food distribution among the poor and the homeless. The college volunteers also distributed masks in the villages and the adjoining areas of college. Hundreds of masks were not only distributed free of cost but even the villagers were apprised of the ways to use and dispose off the same.

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Assessment and Feedback

The College has also successfully implemented the structured feedback system that ensures that the concerns of the students are heard and addressed. So far, we have successfully completed five cycles of taking holistic feedback from the students that have been analysed and the issues related to academics, infrastructure and facilities raised have been addressed. Along with this, the IQAC also takes feedback on curriculum from different stakeholders. The action taken report is subsequently prepared and discussed with the different departments.

Community Outreach Programme

SLC is actively sensitive to its Institutional Social Responsibility and promotes institution- neighbourhood - community initiatives and outreach programs through its various activities that broadly fall under NCC/NSS/WDC/EOC/Sports. SLC is surrounded by many underdeveloped, overpopulated and minority

community localities, and so becomes the sole facilitator, in the area, of achieving academic excellence for students belonging to economically backward classes and minority communities. SLC has also adopted Shahdaramandi and regularly conducts cleanliness drives.

- ➔ The College is located in an area of the city densely populated by under-privileged sections of society. SLC's policy of giving preference to the girls students in the Admission is largely aimed at correcting the gender bias/disparity in the neighborhood and community.
- ➔ SLC is the foremost College in East Delhi Campus of the University of Delhi with outstanding Sports facilities. The College promotes sports and games in the trans-Yamuna region of Delhi by providing opportunities and best coaching facilities to the young and talented players from low-income groups or underprivileged sections of society.
- ➔ The College has conducted various surveys in the past, including the survey as part of the Innovative project 'Old Age Homes in Delhi – Understanding the Challenges Faced by Them and Their Contribution to the Society'. The primary objective of this project is to have a closer view at the old age homes functioning in Delhi in order to assess the problems and challenges that these institutions are facing.
- ➔ The College has tie-ups with several NGOs to work for the community. NSS volunteers of the College visit slum areas and spread awareness about cleanliness in collaboration with NGOs.
- ➔ The tree plantation activities organized by the College are aimed at improving the air quality in and around the College, as well as for creating awareness about protection of environment. WDC regularly organises activities to sensitize the students and staff to gender related issues and to promote respect for human beings irrespective of race, religion, colour or gender.
- ➔ Most of the activities of the Equal Opportunities Cell such as remedial classes and Spoken English classes for students from under-privileged communities and facilities for differently abled also largely benefit the students from surrounding areas.
- ➔ The College participates in all national initiatives aimed at promoting good citizenship such as cleanliness drive, skill and entrepreneurship development initiatives, "Make in India" campaign, etc. The College has set up Centre for Skill Development following the launch of this programme by the Union Government.
- ➔ Under the aegis of WDC and ICC, the College regularly organizes workshops, lectures, sensitization programmes, counselling sessions, film screenings and live performances on gender issues and discrimination.
- ➔ SLC has also adopted Shahdara mandi and has conducted cleanliness drives, switch over to cashless trading and plastic free campaigns.
- ➔ SLC has adopted 5 villages under UBA project under MoE, GOI. The team has conducted extensive surveys of the said villages, participated in the Swachata hi Sewa campaign, and interacted with villagers and other stakeholders of the villages. The team has also worked with and helped the adopted villages during COVID-19 pandemic in following ways: poster and video distribution about maintaining hygiene and sanitation, distribution of food packets, distribution of groceries, distribution of masks, dissemination of information through Whatsapp groups to farmers regarding precautions to be taken in farming activities during the pandemic etc.
- ➔ The NSS of the College also regularly organizes "Nirbheek" – One week Women self-defense camp for girls students.

- ➔ The UBA team and NSS team of the College has already conducted cleanliness drives in Yamuna Bazaar Ghat no 21. The Development and Maintenance of Ghat No.-21 has been done along with repairing, beautification, restructuring, painting and colouring work.
- ➔ The students at SLC are taught the importance of participating in community service and contributing to help all the sections of society specially deprived and underprivileged. The NSS wing of the College lives up to its motto “Love All and Serve All”. The students engaged with NSS volunteer with a number of NGOs. They also organize clothes donation drives to support NGO slike Amar Jyoti. The NSS, every year, organizes a blood donation camp in the College. NCC girls of SLC have participated and organized Self- defense Camp, Yoga Camp, Tree Plantation drive and save Yamuna Campaign’. The NSS of the College has also worked on an in-house project of restoration of Yamuna Ghats. The UB Ateam and NSS team of the College has already conducted cleanliness drives in Yamuna Bazaar Ghat no 21. The Development and Maintenance of Ghat No.-21 has been done along with repairing, beautification, restructuring, painting and coloring work.
- ➔ The College also provides fee concession, financial aid, book aid, awards and prizes to students from underprivileged sections of society.
- ➔ The College has NCC, NSS, Women Development Cell, Centre for Holistic Development, Centre for Industry Interaction and Skill Development, Ambedkar Study Circle, Gandhi Study Circle etc. which organize events dedicated towards community service like blood donation camp, tree plantation drive, Save Yamuna Campaign, gender sensitization, identity discourses, moral education etc. to enhance the sense of community feeling and citizenship among the students.
- ➔ The Enactus team of the College has worked on community outreach projects like “PRAYOJYA” (2018). The project is an effort to reduce plastic pollutants in our surrounding by transforming them from waste plastic bottle to useful and decorative plastic utensils and simultaneously providing employment to women from underprivileged communities and train them in the art of making different kinds of decorative stuff with plastic.
- ➔ Various centres of SLC viz. Innovation, E-cell, CSD of the college collaborated with several research institutes and departments to explore the student’s latent skills and also conducted field trips, industrial and educational visits.
- ➔ Women Development Centre (WDC) in collaboration with National Service Scheme (NSS) and Swachhta Action Plan (SAP) of SLC organised awareness program on “Menstrual Hygiene Awareness Campaign”.

Institutional Social Responsibility Initiatives

- ➔ The College actively supports and observes government advisories issued about preventive measures, for Covid-19 pandemic, like hand hygiene, social distancing, cough etiquette are circulated among the staff, students, surrounding neighborhood and in adopted villages from time to time.
- ➔ A WhatsApp group with members from the adopted villages, under UBA, like the Pradhans, village elders and officials has been formed so as to spread awareness about hygiene and sanitation among as many households as possible.
- ➔ The students of the College have been making handmade soap and masks to distribute them in their neighborhood so as to help people maintain good hygiene and fight Covid-19 pandemic.

- ➔ NSS volunteers have also taken care of abandoned pets and stray animals; they feed them on every day basis in their neighborhoods.
 - ➔ The College is actively involved in food distribution among the poor and the homeless. NSS students of the college also regularly distribute ration to the needy people in slum areas.
 - ➔ Student members also make handmade masks and distribute them to vegetable vendors, slum dwellers and many others in their neighborhood.
 - ➔ The UB Ateam and NSS team of the College conducts cleanliness drives in Yamuna Bazaar Ghat no 21.
 - ➔ The Development and Maintenance of Ghat No.-21 has been done along with repairing, beautification, restructuring, painting and colouring work.
- SLC students academically help the students in villages and slums through virtual modes.

Mental Well-being Initiatives

- ➔ The Head of the institution regularly meets and interacts with students via virtual platform in order to resolve their queries regarding uncertainty of the academic session due to the pandemic situation.
- ➔ Counseling Cell has been activated with Mobile no. of professional counsellor and doctor to address students' anxiety and other issues.
- ➔ The college also regularly organizes counselling sessions for students through ICC, WDC and Training & Placement Cell.
- ➔ The Principal follows the open door policy and is always available to students during office hours.
- ➔ The College has a very active mentoring mechanism in which teachers mentor and regularly meet their mentee (students) in order to resolve their academic and other concerns.
- ➔ During the Covid-19 pandemic, the college also facilitated the mobile data recharge of students' phones so that they do not miss out on interactions and classes with teachers.

Remedial Classes

SLC regularly conducts remedial classes, every semester, for students in all the departments that largely benefit students in resolving their doubts and difficulties related to their respective courses and papers.

Institution's Innovation Council

SLC established Innovation Council (IIC) under MoE's, GOI Innovation Cell, an initiative launched in November of 2018. The primary mandate of Innovation Cell, MoE, GOI is to encourage, inspire and nurture young students by supporting them to work with new ideas. SLC's Innovation Council works towards inculcating the spirit of innovation among students, and develop a start-up ecosystem. In IIC, students participate in mentoring sessions, workshops and innovative idea competitions. Since its inception, the IIC, SLC has produced and developed very promising startup ideas such as Sajagta, Steam Power generator, Infolge, and Abhikalpana etc. Four SLC faculty members have successfully completed the Ambassador Training Programme conducted by Innovation Cell, MoE, GOI and it has received 3 stars since its establishment.

Skill Based Courses

Skill Development Centre, SLC, started Add-On Certificate and Diploma courses in foreign languages in 2018 under the aegis of Department of Germanic & Romance Studies and Department of East Asian Studies, University of Delhi.

The following Certificate and Diploma courses are offered by the College:

- ➔ Certificate course in four Foreign Language: German/Spanish/French (Affiliated to Department of Germanic and Romance Studies, University of Delhi).
- ➔ Certificate course in stock trading “Mastering the Stock Market” in collaboration with BSE Institute Ltd. C.
- ➔ Diploma in Foreign Language: German/Spanish/French (Affiliated to Department of Germanic and Romance Studies, University of Delhi).
- ➔ Certificate course in Foreign Language: Chinese/Japanese/Korean (Affiliated to Department of East Asian Studies, University of Delhi).
- ➔ Certificate Course on ‘Preparation & Application of Magnetic Nanoparticles and Hands-on Software Training’ by DBT.

Powered by Renewable Energy

The Solar Power plant of the College is fully functional and generates power covering 45% of our peak demand. The Solar Power plant, installed in the college, is a collaborative initiative with IPGCL, Govt. of NCT of Delhi wherein the said govt. agency has borne the full cost of the installation of the Solar panels in the college. We have been saving power as well as financial resources since the plant became fully functional. The College also practices regular switch off drives so as to save and conserve energy.



Other Green Initiatives

Conservation of environment has been the focus of College. The students and faculty members of the College work in coordination to cultivate and preserve a green environment.

- ➔ The college is a tobacco-free, smoke-free zone and has said a loud ‘NO’ to crackers and plastic bags.
- ➔ The tree plantation activities organized by the College are aimed at improving the air quality in and around the College, as well as for creating awareness about protection of environment.
- ➔ The College takes special care to inculcate the habit of switching off fans and lights when these are not in use.
- ➔ All garden waste is used for making compost in compost pits.
- ➔ The college promotes energy saving initiatives and encourages all stakeholders to use battery power vehicle.
- ➔ Burning of garden waste is strictly prohibited on the Campus to minimize air pollution.
- ➔ E-waste is routed through appropriate channels for proper disposal.
- ➔ In order to ensure safe drinking water, the College has installed ROs in the campus.
- ➔ The college has developed pedestrian friendly pathways. All are encouraged to use the same
- ➔ College also engages in tree plantation in and around the campus.

Renewable energy in the college is also an important focus area.

- ➔ College made efforts for carbon neutrality, with large green-patches, gardens, and a vast collection of trees.

College has installed three LED screens to communicate with students and faculty to reduce the use of paper in printing official notices etc.

- ➔ The College is increasingly shifting to the use of LED lights.

E-waste generated in the campus is managed as per the E-Waste Management through a committee. The

- ➔ E-waste is disposed off to authorized recyclers.

→ The Garden Committee attempts to ensure the use of natural fertilizers and natural material for supporting plants and climbers.

Rain Water Harvesting

As the institution is committed to zero water wastage and harnessing, the power of every drop of this precious commodity, SLC has taken an important measure like rain water harvesting system.

Recycling Papers

SLC is sensitive towards the cause of conserving natural resources and promotes the culture of respecting nature. SLC, in collaboration with NGO Jaagruti, has started recycling of waste papers and in return has received numerous reams of paper.



LED Lights

The usage of LED lights has reduced the power consumption heavily. The installation of LED lights following the installation of solar panels has helped the College to save its financial resources. In addition to it, switch-off drills are carried on regular basis to make the SLCians aware and alert regarding energy consumption and saving.

Sewage Treatment Plant

The college has a sewage treatment plant of capacity 75000 L which is fully operational

Opportunities for neighbourhood under-privileged School children to participate/coaching facility for

SLC aims at promotion and improvement of sports and games in trans-Yamuna region of Delhi by providing opportunities and best coaching facilities to the young and talented players of the society. The endeavor is to provide a platform to young talented players with state-of-the-art amenities so that they learn, train and improve their standard in sports and games, and excel at the international and national level. For the purpose, the college has taken a new initiative to provide free and regular coaching in the above mentioned games to deserving and talented students from neighboring schools. The aim is also to promote indigenous games among the youth who are in some ways unaware of the vast career possibilities to be explored in our national games and sports.

Digital Practices

The College has already adopted digital practices in all office and students related work. IQAC collaborates with various departments to organize virtual lectures and talks and interviews of eminent personalities across the world. The College also encourages the faculty to record lectures through screen cast-o-matic v2.0 software for future reference and benefit of the students.

The Administration took the digitalization one step further by transfiguring the students' I-cards into Single Sign-on (SSO) card. This card bearing bar-code is an in-house product developed by the technical team of the college. This one stop card is revolutionary as it makes the entire data just one click away and so is less time-consuming with minimum chances of being faulty and ensures better access to the on-campus facilities like:

- a) Issuing books in library- the students can issue books with the help of SSO card and they would not require any separate library card.
- b) Security- It makes screening easier on special days like student elections, College fest, annual function etc. to avoid any scuffles and untoward incidents in the campus.
- c) Payment of bills- the College is also thinking of creating a pay wallet which will be connected with students' account so automate their campus experience better.

The Administration is virtually in touch with the non-teaching staff all the time during office hours. All the officials of the College are connected with the Principal through Google worksheet where routine jobs are assigned to concerned officials and are routinely monitored.

The College teaching staff is always updated with real-time LED display in the staffroom which is used for the display of time-table and other important notices.

Inclusive Education and Development

The practice of Inclusive Education and Development continues from the last year as it serves meaningful benefit for the students. Since the location of the College is very strategic, the students from NCR/East Delhi get the maximum benefit of studying in a premier Delhi University College. The College gives value-based education to the students (as is the vision of the College) and also takes care of the professionalism of the Industry/market and prepares the students for the competitive world outside. Remedial classes, workshops organized by different departments, Placement Cell and Skill Development Cell, industry interaction through CII give the students enough exposure and feel of the professional world.

Yamuna Festival 2.0

Yamuna Festival 2.0 was organised by Shyam Lal College in collaboration with NSS & IQAC on the 5th and 6th April 2022. Students organised various activities like a cleanliness drive, plantation drive, lamp lighting, Swachhta Pledge Yamuna Aarti etc. at Yamuna Ghat No. 21 near Yamuna Bazaar (Kashmiri Gate) on 5th April 2022. Students also put up a stall to display eco-friendly products like handmade lamps (Diyas) and plastic-based plant pots, bird houses etc. 31 students participated in this event.

East Delhi Flower Show 2022

Shyam Lal College, University of Delhi conducted its annual "EAST DELHI FLOWER SHOW-UMANG 4.0" on 28th February 2022 in the sports ground of the college campus. Garden committee of SLC in collaboration with Eco Club, Swachhta Action Plan (SAP) and IQAC conducted PUSHMAHOTSAV-4.0 successfully. During the event, the college also conducted several competitions namely Best out of waste, Eco-Friendly Rangoli and Photography and Video graphy competition to encourage students to show their creativity and promote eco-friendly activities. In the best out of waste competition, students were encouraged to use organic waste material to create useful products.

This event helped promote the recycling of goods. Many students participated in the event and made creative pieces. Various nurseries and Chandigarh University participated in this event and displayed their products.

INFRASTRUCTURE

The College makes continuous endeavor that its infrastructure remains capable of meeting all the diverse needs of a healthy educational system in a dynamic environment. As recently as the academic year 2015-16, the College has added an entire new building – the Porta Block – to its existing infrastructure. This building has state-of-the-art infrastructure including CCTV surveillance system, and a 100 seater dedicated Conference Hall, Board Room and Teachers Facilitation Centre with up-to-date ICT facilities. A modern and comfortable environment that enables our students to excel in all areas - academics, sports and extra-curricular activities - is what SLC continually endeavours to provide. In this direction, the Staff Room, the Library, the Office and the Canteen have been recently renovated into fine air-conditioned spaces. Proudly, the entire SLC is now a Wi-Fi zone with internet access available to each and every student of the College. As a premier institution, SLC does not remain content with providing state-of-art infrastructure, it also ensures that this infrastructure remains completely accessible to all its students and faculty, including to differently-abled. The new infrastructure additions in the campus are listed below

- College has undertaken major infra structural up gradation with construction of 2nd Floor in the old building with several new classrooms, Multipurpose Hall and Computer Labs.
- College has completed and operationalist STP plant.
- Construction of Covered Central stage with modern amenities are in full swing.
- Construction of Bigger Amphitheater work is underway.
- New and fresh paver layers are being put throughout the campus.
- All three gates of the college are being upgraded as per the needs of PWBD students.
- Renovation and expansion of Library with modern amenities is underway.
- The Committee room has been developed in the Porta Block.
- Repair renovation has been done in the College Office for smooth conduct of administrative tasks.
- Staff room, wash rooms and Principal office wash room are completely renovated.
- National flag has been permanently installed in the College grounds.
- Green grass carpeting work has been done in the College grounds.
- CCTV under MPLADS fund has been fixated in the whole campuses with coverage of the outside road area.
- Science Labs have been renovated for better conduct of practical classes and examination.
Two store Rooms have been constructed on the roof of the Library.
- IQA Croom and CCTV control room have been developed.
- A Pathway with Green Corridor has been constructed in front of staff room adjacent to playground joining both the buildings.
- LED flood light has been fixed on the top of the building that gives good visibility of the college name.
- One Organic waste composite machine has been purchased as per NGT direction.
- Chemistry Lab has been developed for BSC(H) students.

- CNG Gas Pipeline has become functional in the campus.
- The College now has a state-of-the-art Reading Room with a huge seating capacity.
- Overhead water tank with the capacity of 50,000 litres is fully functional in catering to the water demands of the College.
- The College has also introduced an important designated facility for the PwD students of the College in the form of PwD Facilitation Centre which has dedicated computer systems with all the relevant software installed so as to facilitate the smooth imparting of education to PwD students.
- The College has also constructed a state-of-the-art Teacher Facilitation Centre and Board Room to promote research aptitude among the teachers.
- The Conference Hall has been refurnished with state of the art facilities.
- Over the last year, the College has also developed four Gardens including a herbal garden, two nurseries that have completely changed the outlook of the College building.
- SLC now has an AC furnished cafeteria.
- Bank with ATM.
- Office layout has also been changed to improve the functioning of the administration.
- The College has successfully installed CCTV Camera network in the entire campus.
- The parking area in the College has been fully renovated including its flooring.
- The old building has been fully renovated with 6 washrooms and 2 lifts.
- The college infrastructure has been modernized with the installation of lifts and other proper signage that are PWD friendly.
- A newly furnished reception and waiting area has been constructed.

EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Life at SLC is not about classroom and academics alone, it goes far beyond that. The College believes that participation in an array of cultural and other activities creates a well-rounded personality; confident and socially aware individuals. Students are encouraged to participate in other activities of their interest, and every possible support is made available to them. Participation in extra-curricular activities not only brings diversity and colour to the lives of students, it enables them to shine in their respective fields, get recognition, as well as win prizes and awards from within and outside the College. The support provided by SLC to students to enable them to excel in the activities of their interest broadly covers two areas. Firstly, all faculty members are required, apart from taking their classes, to guide students in at least one activity that they are comfortable in. Secondly, the College regularly invites scholars, experts and distinguished personalities from various walks of life to enlighten the students and faculty alike on the latest ideas, trends, as well as inputs and guidance for achieving excellence in those fields. This is done under the aegis of different Academic and Cultural Associations/Societies that exist in the College.

Students' Union

SLC students have an active say in all affairs concerning the welfare of the students, and this say is exercised through the Students' Union, which is a body of all the students admitted to the College. This body not only leads to a healthy development of participatory and democratic practices among the students, it also enables them to articulate their needs and demands. Each year students get an opportunity to contest elections and get elected to this body. The Students' Union functions under the overall guidance and supervision of the Students' Union Advisory Committee, and it also organizes the Annual Cultural Festival, consisting of activities like dance, music and fashion show.

NCC

Students of SLC are expected to be sensitive and socially aware citizens. The College offers plenty of opportunities to students to put these values to practice through NCC and NSS. The NCC unit of SLC (M) operates under the banner of NCC unit of Shyam Lal College (evening). NCC imbibes in its cadets values of discipline, hard work, and trains them to

protect fellow citizens during times of adversity such as security threats to a community or to the nation itself. NCC girls of SLC participated and organized Self-defense Camp, Yoga Camp, Tree Plantation drive and save Yamuna Campaign. Delhi Police supported the NCC unit of the College in latter's Nirbhek Movement. Students enrolled with the NCC unit are instructed in rifle shooting, the use of admonitions, basic first-aid, mountaineering and trekking through rigorous physical exercise and participation in drills and parades.



NSS

With the motto of "Not Me But You", the NSS unit of SLC is actively involving youth in various community service activities. Committed towards the welfare of society, the NSS unit of SLC regularly undertakes community outreach events like Blood Donation Camps and social awareness campaigns in the College to expand social awareness among the students and help them participate in social welfare

activities. In continuation with its social responsibility, this academic session also, the NSS organized a "Rally on Water Conservation & Cleanliness"; "Rally for Dengue & Malaria Awareness"; "Donation Drive". The college NSS unit organized numerous events during the COVID-19 situation and is consistently spreading the awareness about social distancing, sanitation, and use of masks etc., through various social media platform, video messages and e-posters.



Sports

Sports and fitness activities are an integral component of SLC. The college has full-fledged Department of Physical Education which provides unmatched and state-of-the-art facilities for sports like Hockey, Kabbadi, Baseball, Cricket, Football, Kho-Kho, Chess, Carrom, Yoga, Judo and Athletics. Special emphasis is laid on improving not only the health component and lifestyle but also to instill the qualities of team cohesion and sportsman-spirit. Sports, as a hobby, provides an option to students for

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Academic Societies

SLC has nine departments, classified on the basis of academic subjects taught by the faculty. These are: Chemistry, Commerce, Economics, English, History, Hindi, Mathematics, Physics and Political Science. Each of these departments has its respective Academic Association. Other than various events held by its societies, the Committee also organizes its annual cultural festival Anugoonj and an annual Dramatic, Music and Dance festival dedicated to music legends. We have had two curative shows one in the memory of music legend R. D. Burman and another on Sahir Ludhianvi in the past. This year also saw many great performances by SLCians at various platforms. Like, 'Aakrosh' the Street Play Society performed at MOOD INDIGO, Asia's largest fest held at IIT, Bombay and brought laurels to the college. Likewise, all the Clubs under Fine Arts and Cultural Society, have brought many laurels to the College in various national and university level competitions.



The presence of lush green lawns all around the College have added a beautiful dimension to the College landscape. The Garden Committee of the College is actively involved in implementing green initiatives at the grassroots level. The Faculty as well as the students work in coordination in conserving the natural beauty of the College. The College has three in-built nurseries including a herbal garden. RESERVATION POLICIES & QUOTAS

Reservation of Seats for Scheduled Caste (SC) and Scheduled Tribe (ST) Candidates

22.5% of the total numbers of seats is reserved for Candidates belonging to Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribes (15% for Scheduled Caste and 7.5% for Scheduled Tribes, interchangeable if necessary).

The Candidate must be in possession of the Caste/Tribe certificate in his/her own name at the time of Registration and Admission. The Caste certificate should clearly state:

- (a) Name of his/her caste/tribe
- (b) Whether candidate belongs to SC or ST
- (c) District and the State or Union Territory of Candidate's usual place of residence, and
- (d) the appropriate Govt. of India Schedule under which his / her caste / tribe is approved as SC or ST.

Candidate will have to produce the valid original SC or ST caste/tribe certificate at

the time of admission. The following are empowered to issue the requisite SC / ST

certificate:

- a. District Magistrate / Additional District Magistrate / Collector / Deputy Commissioner / Addl. Deputy Commissioner / Deputy Collector / 1st class Stipendiary Magistrate / City Magistrate / Sub-Divisional Magistrate / Taluka Magistrate / Executive Magistrate / Extra Assistant Commissioner.
- b. Chief Presidency Magistrate / Addl. Chief Presidency Magistrate / Presidency Magistrate.
- c. Revenue Officer not below the rank of Tehsildar.
- d. Sub- Divisional Officer of the area where the Candidate and/ or his family normally resides.
- e. Administrator / Secretary to the Administrator/ Development Officer (Lakshadweep Islands).

Candidates to note that the SC / ST Certificate from any other person / authority shall not be accepted in any case. If the Candidate happens to belong to SC or ST, Candidate's caste / tribe must be listed in the appropriate Govt. of India Schedule.

It is a statutory obligation on the part of Colleges to fill all seats reserved for Scheduled Caste / Scheduled Tribe Candidates.

Colleges shall not refuse admission to any SC / ST Candidate on the basis of medium of instruction. Any deficiency in the knowledge of any particular language should be addressed; for this purpose remedial classes may be arranged by the College by utilizing grants available from University Grants Commission.

Reservation of Seats for Other Backward Classes (OBC, Non-Creamy Layer, Central List)

27% seats are reserved for the Candidates belonging to Other Backward Classes (OBC - Non-Creamy Layer, Central List).

At the time of giving admission to an OBC Candidate, the College will ensure that the caste is included in the Central List of OBC (the OBC status is to be determined on the basis of the Central (Govt. of India) List of OBCs notified by the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment on the recommendations of the National Commission for Backward Classes (available at the website <http://ncbc.nic.in/backward-classes/index.html>.) The certificate must mention non-creamy layer status of the Candidate (Non-creamy layer status issued by an authority mentioned in DOPT Office Memorandum no. 36012/22/93- Estt. (SCT) dated 15.11.1993).

The OBC Candidates who belong to the 'Non-Creamy Layer' and whose caste appears in the Central List of the OBCs only, shall be eligible to be considered for admission under the OBC category (Validity period of OBC certificate in respect of 'non-creamy layer' status of the Candidates as per DOPT Office Memorandum No. 36036/2/2013- Estt. (Res- I) dated 31 March 2016). The certificate should be issued on or after 31st March, 2022. It is a statutory obligation on the part of Colleges to fill the seats reserved for OBC Candidates.

Reservation policy for Economically Weaker Sections (EWS)

As per the University of Delhi notifications (Reference No. Aca. I / Reservation of EWSs / 2019/ 63 Dated 28th March 2019 and Reference No. Aca. I / Reservation of EWSs / 2019 / 101 Dated 15th May 2019), for the reservation for Economically Weaker Sections (EWSs) Category, the University Departments / Centres / Colleges have reserved 10% seats for admission of candidates belonging to EWS category .

Reservation of Seats for Persons with Benchmark Disabilities (PwBD)

A. Locomotor Disability

Locomotor disability (a person's inability to execute distinctive activities associated with movement of self and objects resulting from affliction of musculoskeletal or nervous system or both), including—

1. "**leprosy cured person**" means a person who has been cured of leprosy but is suffering from—
 - i) loss of sensation in hands or feet as well as loss of sensation and paresis in the eye and eye-lid but with no manifestation of deformity;
 - ii) manifest deformity and paresis but having sufficient mobility in their hands and feet to enable them to engage in normal economic activity;
 - iii) extreme physical deformity as well as advanced age which prevents him/her from undertaking any gainful occupation, and the expression "leprosy cured" shall be construed accordingly;

"cerebral palsy" means a Group of non-progressive neurological condition affecting body movements

and muscle coordination, caused by damage to one or more specific areas of the brain, usually occurring before

during or shortly after birth;

2. "**dwarfism**" means a medical or genetic condition resulting in an adult height of 4 feet 10 inches (147 centimeters) or less;
3. "**muscular dystrophy**" means a group of hereditary genetic muscle disease that weakens the muscles that move the human body and persons with multiple dystrophy have incorrect and missing information in their genes, which prevents them from making the proteins they need for healthy muscles. It is characterised by progressive skeletal muscle weakness, defects in muscle proteins, and the death of muscle cells and tissue;
4. "**acid attack victims**" means a person disfigured due to violent assaults by throwing of acid or similar corrosive substance.

B. Visual impairment

5. "**blindness**" means a condition where a person has any of the following conditions, after best correction
 - i) total absence of sight; or
 - ii) visual acuity less than 3/60 or less than 10/200 (Snellen) in the better eye with best possible correction; or
 - iii) limitation of the field of vision subtending an angle of less than 10 degree.
6. "**low-vision**" means a condition where a person has any of the following conditions, namely:
 - i) visual acuity not exceeding 6/18 or less than 20/60 upto 3/60 or upto 10/200 (Snellen) in the better eye with best possible corrections; or
 - ii) limitation of the field of vision subtending an angle of less than 40 degree upto 10 degree.

C. Hearing Impairment

7. "**deaf**" means persons having 70 DB hearing loss in speech frequencies in both ears;
8. "**hard of hearing**" means person having 60 DB to 70 DB hearing loss in speech frequencies in both ears;
9. "**speech and language disability**" means a permanent disability arising out of conditions such as laryngectomy or aphasia affecting one or more components of speech and language due to organic or neurological causes.

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D. Intellectual Disability

A condition characterised by significant limitation both in intellectual functioning (reasoning, learning, problemsolving) and in adaptive behaviour which covers a range of every day, social and practical skills, including—

10. "**specific learning disabilities**" means a heterogeneous group of conditions wherein there is a deficit in processing language, spoken or written, that may manifest itself as a difficulty to comprehend, speak, read, write, spell, or to do mathematical calculations and includes such conditions as perceptual disabilities, dyslexia, dysgraphia, dyscalculia, dyspraxia and developmental aphasia;
11. "**autism spectrum disorder**" means a neuro-developmental condition typically appearing in the first three years of life that significantly affects a person's ability to communicate, understand relationships and relate to others, and is frequently associated with unusual or stereotypical rituals or behaviours.

E. Mental Behaviour

"**Mental illness**" means a substantial disorder of thinking, mood, perception, orientation or memory that grossly impairs judgment, behaviour, capacity to recognise reality or ability to meet the ordinary demands of life, but does not include retardation which is a condition of arrested or incomplete development of mind of a person, specially characterised by subnormality of intelligence.

F. Disability caused due to Chronic neurological conditions, such as—

12. "**multiple sclerosis**" means an inflammatory, nervous system disease in which the myelin sheaths around the axons of nerve cells of the brain and spinal cord are damaged, leading to demyelination and affecting the ability of nerve cells in the brain and spinal cord to communicate with each other;
13. "**Parkinson's disease**" means a progressive disease of the nervous system marked by tremor, muscular rigidity, and slow, imprecise movement, chiefly affecting middle-aged and elderly people associated with degeneration of the basal ganglia of the brain and a deficiency of the neurotransmitter dopamine.

F. Blood Disorder

14. "**haemophilia**" means an inheritable disease, usually affecting only male but transmitted by women to their male children, characterised by loss or impairment of the normal clotting ability of blood so that a minor wound may result in fatal bleeding;
15. "**Thalassemia**" means a group of inherited disorders characterised by reduced or absent amounts of haemoglobin.
16. "**Sickle cell disease**" means a haemolytic disorder characterised by chronic anaemia, painful events, and various complications due to associated tissue and organ damage; "haemolytic" refers to the destruction of the cell membrane of red blood cells resulting in the release of haemoglobin.

F. Multiple Disabilities (more than one of the above specified disabilities)

Multiple disabilities including deaf blindness which means a condition in which a person may have combination of hearing and visual impairments causing severe communication, developmental, and educational problems.

Any other category as may be notified by the Central Government.

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Concession/Waiver of fees in respect of Persons with Benchmark Disabilities (PwBD)

- a. Candidates with physical disabilities pursuing various programs of study in the Faculties, Departments, Centres, and Institutions / Colleges of the University shall be **exempted from payment of fees, including examination fee and other University fees**, except Admission fee, subscription towards Delhi University students' Union and Identity Card fee (As per amendment to Ordinance X(4) of the University).
- b. PwBD Candidates who meet the merit for the unreserved category and will take admission in the unreserved category (UR) will pay the fee relevant for PwBD Candidate.
- c. As per the Executive Council Resolution No. 50 dated 03.11.2012, students with physical disabilities residing in different Hostels / Halls of the University are **exempted from payment of all hostel fees and charges** except refundable caution fee and the mess fees. Persons with Physical Disabilities who are students shall pay 50% of the Mess fee and the remaining **50% of their Mess Fee** will be met by the University of Delhi. **Similar norms are to be adopted by the Colleges in respect of PwBD Students residing in various hostels of the Colleges.**
- d. PwBD students who are getting fellowships / financial assistance shall be exempted from payment of fees / charges / mess fees subject to the following conditions.

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Concession/Waiver of fees in respect of Persons with Benchmark Disabilities (PwBD)

Five percent (5%) of seats are reserved for Candidates under this category, program-wise in all colleges.

Candidates desirous of taking admission under the CW quota of the University must appear in CUET 2022.

All such Candidates have to upload the Educational Concession certificate issued by **any of the following authorities** on the proper letterhead:

- (a) Secretary, Kendriya Sainik Board, Delhi.
- (b) Secretary, Rajya Zila Sainik Board.
- (c) Officer-in-Charge, Record Office.
- (d) 1st Class Stipendiary Magistrate.
- (e) Ministry of Home Affairs (For Police Personnel in receipt of Gallantry Awards)

No other format shall be permissible. Proofs of the CW category in the form of ID card of parent or dependent, Medical card, Ration card, CSD card, etc. are not admissible in lieu of certificate in correct format. The priority must be clearly mentioned in the certificate. Certificates that do not mention the relevant priority will not be considered.

Admission may be offered to the Children/Widows of Personnel of the Armed Forces (**Priority to IX**) including Para-Military Personnel (**only Priority I to V**), in the following order of preference:

Priority I	Widows/Wards of Defence personnel killed in action;
Priority II	Wards of Defence Personnel disabled in action and boarded out from service with disability attributable to military service;
Priority III	Widows/Wards of Defence Personnel who died while in service with death attributable to military service;
Priority IV	Wards of Defence Personnel disabled in service and boarded out with disability attributable to military service;
Priority V	Wards of Ex-servicemen and Serving personnel, including personnel of police forces who are in receipt of Gallantry Awards; i) ParamVir Chakra ii) Ashok Chakra iii) MahaVir Chakra iv) Kirti Chakra v) Vir Chakra vi) Shaurya Chakra vii) President's Police Medal for Gallantry/President Gallantry Medal for the fire services personnel viii) Sena Medal (Gallantry), Nau Sena Medal (Gallantry), Vayu Sena Medal (Gallantry) ix) Mention-in-Despatches x) Police Medal for Gallantry/Gallantry Medal for fire services

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Reservation of Kashmiri Migrants (KM)

Up to 5% seats are reserved program-wise in all colleges for the wards of Kashmiri Migrants. All the wards of Kashmiri Migrants will have to upload a certificate of registration as Kashmiri Migrants issued by Divisional Commissioner/ Relief Commissioner.

Candidates desirous of taking admission under the Kashmiri Migrants quota must appear in CUET 2022.

Prime Minister's Special Scholarship Scheme for J&K students

Candidates desirous of taking admission under the Prime Minister's Special Scholarship Scheme for J&K students must appear in CUET 2022.

Nomination of Seats for Sikkimese Students

Candidates desirous of taking admission under the Sikkim nomination scheme must appear in CUET 2022.

Sikkimese students nominated by the Govt. of Sikkim shall be considered for admission by the University in Colleges where hostel facilities are available (AC Resolutions 51 dated 05/06/1980 and 122 dated 17/12/1990). The allocation of Sikkimese students for admission as well as for hostel accommodation in respective colleges be made by the Vice-Chancellor at his discretion.

Ward Quota of Employees of University of Delhi

Candidates desirous of taking admission under the Ward Quota of Employees of University of Delhi must appear in CUET 2022.

Admission to the wards of University and its College employees, both teaching and non-teaching will be done as per Academic Council resolution 9 a & b dated 27.11.2020 and subsequent amendments thereof.

Candidates must be in possession of a valid Employment Certificate issued by due officials at the time of registration. Only the Employment certificate uploaded at the time of registration will be considered. I-cards, Aadhar Card and/or any other document will not be accepted.

Extra-Curricular Activities (ECA) and Sports Quota

Candidates desirous of taking admission under the supernumerary quota for ECA and/or Sports must appear in CUET 2022.

For admissions to ECA and Sports supernumerary seats a weightage of 25% will be given to CUET score and 75% to certificates/trials/performances.

Further details shall be notified separately.

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IMPORTANT STUDENT RELATED INFORMATION

IDENTITY CARD

Every student is issued an Identity Card by the college immediately after admission.

He/she is expected to carry his/her identity card with him/her at all times. She/he will have to produce the same whenever required to do so by any member of the College staff in the college premises or outside or when he/she visits the college office for payment of fees or for any other purpose or when he/she goes to the College Library. If the identity card is lost, a fee of 50/- will be charged for issuing a duplicate card.

College Timings: 8 am to 3 pm.

ATTENDANCE REGULATIONS

Every student must complete at least, two-thirds attendance of the total lectures/practicals held during the academic year to be eligible to appear in the University Examination failing which the students would not be allowed to appear in the examination. Students are governed by the rules and regulations laid down by the University in its Ordinance VII.

Parents/guardians are expected to know the status of attendance of their ward at the end of each semester. The students falling short of attendance at the end of each semester are notified by the College Students Attendance Committee.

UNIVERSITY EXAMINATION

University of Delhi holds Examination/s for different courses for the final assessment of the students at the end of each semester. For details, students should regularly check the college notice board as well as college/University website.

Note: No student shall be deemed to have qualified for appearing in the University examination unless he/she fulfills the required attendance rules and other conditions.

MIGRATION

1. As per University Rules, no migration is allowed in the first year.
2. Migration to the II year III Year from other Universities and Colleges may be allowed as per University Guidelines, subject to availability of seats and minimum percentage of marks as decided by the College.

DISCIPLINE OF THE COLLEGE

- (1) Students are expected to maintain a high standard of discipline and shall endeavor to promote the reputation of the Brand SLC and to inculcate camaraderie, mutual respect and healthy fellow feelings.
- (2) Student against whom disciplinary action has been taken may not be granted re-admission. Such a student, apart from disciplinary action against him/her, will be liable to forfeit any prizes won or position held, if so, decided by the College Proctorial Board. The College has a very active Proctorial Board and presently Mr. Sanjeev Kumar, Department of Economics is the convenor of the Board. Students may contact the Proctorial Board for any kind of information, assistance and emergency. The college has also deployed a very active security agency and in case of any assistance or emergency, students may contact the security supervisor at his office near the college gate (All emergency/helpline numbers are displayed at the college gate).

CODE OF CONDUCT FOR STUDENTS

- (1) Student shall refrain from;
 - (a) Misbehaviour towards members of the staff (teaching and administrative) and fellow students;
 - (b) Smoking, drinking, gambling and drug-taking in any form;
 - (c) Eve-teasing;
 - (d) Obstructing passage in the verandah;
 - (e) Causing damage to college building, furniture, fixtures, garden, canteen crockery, or to any other property;
 - (f) Making noise in or outside the class-rooms;
 - (g) Associating with outsiders to create indiscipline in any form in the college. No outsider will be allowed in the college without any expressed purpose and all visitors will have to make entry in the visitors register.
 - (h) Unauthorized entry in the college building on holidays;
 - (i) Unauthorized vehicle parking inside the College premises.
- (2) Students are liable to summary punishment for any of the offences listed at clause (a) to (i) above or any other behaviour considered as misconduct by the Proctorial Board.
- (3) Students are expected to be regular in their classes.
- (4) Students must keep the College neat and clean.
- (5) Students must observe complete silence in the Library and obey standing orders. They are expected to utilize the facilities properly.
- (6) Students may participate in their favorite games or sports, abiding by rules and regulations framed by the Sports Committee.
- (7) Students must always keep their Identity card with them, and produce it as and when asked for.
- (8) Students are advised to see the General Notice Board, the Sports Notice Board and the Library Notice Board as well as College website daily for obtaining up-to-date information of College notices/activities/programmes.
- (9) West Bengal Prevention of Defacement of Property Act has been promulgated in Delhi to keep the city clean. Punishment for contravention of its provisions is an imprisonment for a term of six months or a fine of 1000/- or both.
- (10) Students are expected not to invite any guest during the teaching hours in the College.
- (11) Suggestions from students are always welcome and will be given due attention.

❖ **The students are required fill up the undertaking to maintain the Code of Conduct as notified by the University of Delhi failing which they might be subjected to disciplinary action.**

❖ **The Students are required to submit an online undertaking as regards prohibition of ragging by visiting the College website.**

❖ **The students are required to observe all Covid-19 SOP while visiting college for any work.**

Appendices

Important Ordinances of the University

Successful Candidates will be required to abide by the Ordinances of the University and will be required to provide a written undertaking to this effect at the time of admission. A few extracts of important ordinances are reproduced here.

ORDINANCE XV-B: Maintenance of Discipline among Students of the University

1. All powers relating to discipline and disciplinary action are vested in the Vice-Chancellor.
2. The Vice-Chancellor may delegate all or such powers as he / she deems proper to the Proctor and to such other persons as he/she may specify in this behalf.
3. Without prejudice to the generality of power to enforce discipline under the Ordinance the following shall amount to acts of gross indiscipline:
 - a. Physical assault, or threat to use physical force, against any member of the teaching and non-teaching staff of any Institution / Department and against any student within the University of Delhi
 - b. Carrying of, use of or threat to use of any weapons
 - c. Any violation of the provisions of the Civil Rights Protection Act, 1976
 - d. Violation of the status, dignity and honour of students belonging to the scheduled castes and tribes
 - e. Any practice-whether verbal or otherwise-derogatory of women
 - f. Any attempt at bribing or corruption in any manner
 - g. Willful destruction of institutional property
 - h. Creating ill-will or intolerance on religious or communal grounds
 - i. Causing disruption in any manner of the academic functioning of the University system;
 - j. Prohibition of Ragging as per Ordinance XV-C.
4. Without prejudice to the generality of his / her powers relating to the maintenance of discipline and taking such action in the interest of maintaining discipline as may seem to him/her appropriate, the Vice-Chancellor, may in the exercise of his / her powers aforesaid order or direct that any student or students -
 - (a) be expelled; or
 - (b) be, for a stated period rusticated; or
 - (c) be not for a stated period, admitted to a programme or programmes of study in a College, Department or Institution of the University; or
 - (d) be fined with a sum of rupees that may be specified; or
 - (e) be debarred from taking a University or College or Departmental Examination or Examinations for one or more years; or that the result of the student or students concerned in the Examination or Examinations in which he /she or they have appeared be cancelled.
5. Institutions, Halls and teaching in the concerned Departments. They may exercise their authority through, or delegate authority to such of the teachers in their Colleges, Institutions or Departments as they may specify for these purposes.
6. Without prejudice to the powers of the Vice-Chancellor and the Proctor as aforesaid, detailed rules of

the Principals of Colleges, Heads of Halls, Deans of Faculties and Heads of Teaching Departments in this University. Each student shall be expected to provide himself / herself with a copy of these rules. At the time of admission, every student shall be required to sign a declaration that on admission he /she submit himself / herself to the disciplinary jurisdiction of the Vice-Chancellor and several authorities of the University who may be vested with the authority to exercise discipline under the Acts, the Statutes, the Ordinances and the rules that have been framed therein by the University.

ORDINANCE XV-C: Prohibition and Punishment for Ragging

1. Ragging in any form is strictly prohibited, within the premises of College/ Department or Institution and any part of Delhi University system as well as on public transport.
2. Any individual or collective act or practice of ragging constitutes gross indiscipline and shall be dealt with under this Ordinance.
3. Ragging for the purposes of this Ordinance, ordinarily means any act, conduct or practice by which dominant power or status of senior students is brought to bear on students freshly enrolled or students who are in any way considered junior or inferior by other students; and includes individual or collective acts or practices which:
 - a. Involve physical assault or threat to use of physical force.
 - b. Violate the status, dignity and honour of women students.
 - c. Violate the status, dignity and honour of students belonging to the scheduled caste and tribe.
 - d. Expose students to ridicule and contempt and affect their self-esteem.
 - e. Entail verbal abuse and aggression, indecent gestures and obscene behavior.
4. The Principal of a College, the Head of the Department or an Institution, the authorities of College, or University Hostel or Halls of Residence shall take immediate action on any information of the occurrence of ragging.
5. Notwithstanding anything in Clause above, the Proctor may also suo moto enquire into any incident of ragging and make a report to the Vice-Chancellor of the identity of those who have engaged in ragging and the nature of the incident.
6. The Proctor may also submit an initial report establishing the identity of the perpetrators of ragging and the nature of the ragging incident.
7. If the Principal of a College or Head of the Department or Institution or the Proctor is satisfied that for some reason, to be recorded in writing, it is not reasonably practical to hold such an enquiry, he/ she may so advise the Vice-Chancellor accordingly.
8. When the Vice-Chancellor is satisfied that it is not expedient to hold such an enquiry, his/ her decision shall be final.
9. On the receipt of a report under Clause (5) or (6) or a determination by the relevant authority under clause (7) disclosing the occurrence of ragging incidents described in Clause 3(a), (b) and (c), the Vice-Chancellor shall direct or order rustication of a student or students for a specific number of years.
10. The Vice-chancellor may in other cases of ragging order or direct that any student or students be expelled or be not for a stated period, admitted to a programme of study in a college, departmental examination for one or more years or that the results of the student or students concerned in the examination or examinations in which they appeared be cancelled.
11. In case any students who have obtained degrees or diplomas of the University of Delhi are found guilty; under this Ordinance, appropriate action will be taken under Statute 15 for withdrawal of degrees or diploma

conferred by the University.

12. For the purpose of this Ordinance, abetment to ragging whether by way of any act, practice or incitement of ragging will also amount to ragging.
13. All Institutions within the Delhi University system shall be obligated to carry out instructions / directions issued under this Ordinance, and to give aid assistance to the Vice-Chancellor to achieve the effective implementation of the Ordinance.

Order of the Vice-Chancellor in pursuance of Ordinance XV-C: Where incident(s) of ragging are reported to the Vice-Chancellor by any authority under this Ordinance, the students(s) involved in ragging, shall be expelled for a specified term, designated in the order. Non-students involved in reports of ragging will be proceeded with under the criminal law of India; they will also be rendered ineligible for a period of five years from seeking enrolment in any of the institutions of the University of Delhi. Students against whom necessary action is taken under this note, will be given post decisional hearing, with strict adherence to the rules of natural justice.

ORDINANCE XV-D/The Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013 (MINISTRY OF LAW AND JUSTICE)

An Act to provide protection against sexual harassment of women at work place and for the prevention and redressal of complaints of sexual harassment and for matters connected therewith incidental thereto.

WHEREAS sexual harassment results in violation of the fundamental rights of a woman to equality under articles 14 and 15 of the Constitution of India and her right to life and to live with dignity under article 21 of the Constitution and right to practice any profession or to carry on any occupation, trade or business which includes a right to a safe environment free from sexual harassment; AND WHEREAS the protection against sexual harassment and the right to work with dignity are universally recognized human rights by international conventions and instruments such as Convention on the Elimination of all forms of discrimination against Women, which has been ratified on the 25th June, 1993 by the Government of India.

AND WHEREAS it is expedient to make provisions for giving effect to the said Convention for protection of women against sexual harassment at workplace. For details, please see the website
