India assuming the presidency of the G20 on December 1, 2022, is an opportune moment to emblazon its ancient values and practices that advocate oneness, non-violence and global peace. It can capitalize on the achievements of the preceding 17 presidencies and supplement ancient Indian practices and values to build consensus on the divergent views among the countries in order to achieve global solutions to the pressing challenges of our time. India can significantly contribute to building consensus on climate change, agriculture, sustainable development, health, terrorism, global digital infrastructure, and skilling. Effective international cooperation deserves universal agreements, but the Ukrainian crisis is the biggest challenge; otherwise, India's G20 presidency would have been more fruitful in building universal agreements on pressing global issues. However, there are multiple challenges and structural constraints to building a universal consensus. India views the G-20 as a significant venue to assert its leadership and reflect the interests of the global south. India wants to legitimately represent the concerns and aspirations of the global south, and it wants the advanced Western world to fulfill its moral obligations besides pushing a narrative of One Earth, One Family, One Future, which is embedded with the Indian idea of Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam (World is one Family) derived from the Maha Upanishad.

India's G20 presidency offers a great chance for the nation to support the group's goals and deal with some of the most important global concerns. India can take the lead in encouraging greater international cooperation on matters related to public health, reducing tensions in areas prone to conflict, and advancing sustainable development, economic equality, and technology. India can contribute to the creation of a world that is more wealthy, healthy, just, and sustainable by cooperating with other member nations. India has the G20 presidency in 2023, and it has a once-

in-a-lifetime chance to display its distinctive cultural, civilised, and political approaches to advancing prosperity, peace, and harmony on the planet. The teachings of Buddha are an example of India's long tradition of advocating nonviolence and peace. 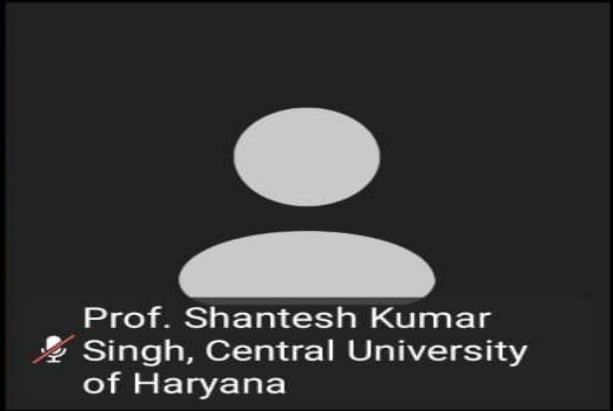

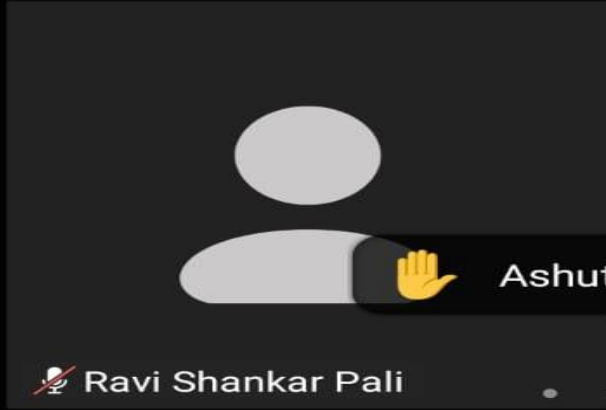
